# IN AN EMERGENCY

## TAKE ACTION



### HOLD! In your room or area. Clear the halls.

#### STUDENTS

- Clear the hallway and remain in your room (or area with the "all clear" sign)
- Do not leave the room

#### ADULTS

- Check your work area
- Account for students and adults announced
- Do business as usual



### SECURE! Get inside. Lock outside doors.

#### STUDENTS

- Return to classrooms
- Do business as usual

#### ADULTS

- Bring everyone indoors
- Lock outside doors
- Increase physical awareness
- Account for students and adults
- Do business as usual



### LOCKDOWN! Assess the situation. Prepare to run, hide, fight.

#### STUDENTS

- Move away from exits
- Maintain silence
- Do not open the door

#### ADULTS

- Lock classroom doors
- Assess the situation to run, hide or fight
- If hiding, use cover and stay as quiet as possible
- If running, barricade door, stay out of sight, if possible
- If fighting, minimize physical aggression



### EVACUATE! To your rally point.

#### STUDENTS

- Bring your glasses
- Leave your stuff behind
- Follow instructions

#### ADULTS

- Close doors and windows
- Grab Emergency Quack
- Lead evacuation to rally point
- Account for students and adults
- Notify if missing, attack or injured students



### SHELTER! Hazard and safety strategy.

#### STUDENTS

- | Hazard     | Safety Strategy       |
|------------|-----------------------|
| Threats    | Move to shelter area  |
| Weather    | Get the most          |
| Explosives | Drop, cover, and hold |

#### ADULTS

- Use safety strategy
- Account for students

**BE READY!**  
**Emergency Preparedness Checklist**  
**BE PREPARED FOR 2 WEEKS!**

**MEDICATION**  
Medication and medical supplies. Ask your provider about an emergency supply.

**WATER**  
At least 1 gallon a day per person. Consider water treatment supplies for long outages.

**SANITATION**  
2-buckets: 1 for urine, 1 for feces. Sawdust, coffee grounds, or shredded paper to cover feces. Hand sanitizer, wet wipes, or extra water for washing.

**FOOD**  
Non-perishable (canned, dehydrated, dried) that doesn't need much prep. Replace every 6 to 12 months. Include manual can opener.

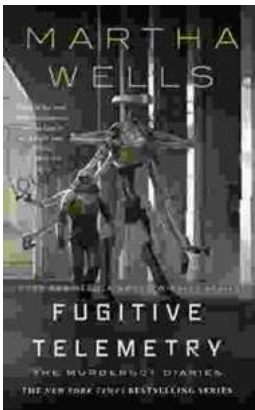
