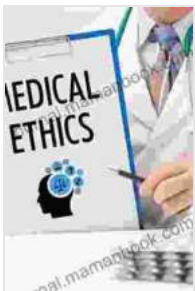


The Ethics of Health Care: A Comprehensive Examination

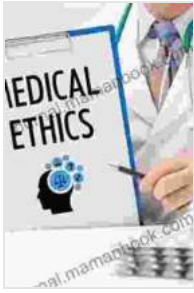

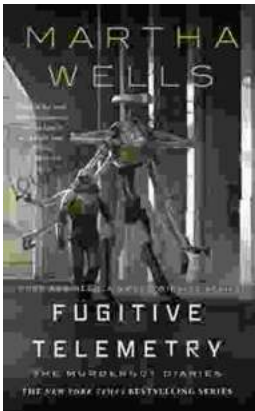
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
